ST. AGATHA'S HISTORICAL COMPLEX RABAT MALTA

At the Board meeting on April 5 it was decided that the Club will continue to restore the frescoes in the Catacombs of St. Agatha in Rabat.

The Board approved to set aside €546 (equivalent to the sum raised from the Stableford Golf Tournament) as part of the expenses envisaged for the cost of restoration of the frescoes. The Board believes that this project is worth perusing. It is estimated that over €3800 is needed for the project. The project will take some time to be completed.

Lion Alfred Micallef Attard will be liaising with the restorer who will start restoration shortly.

The first recipient of the MJF award in Malta was the late Mons. Michael Azzopardi, the founder of Dar tal-Providenza at Siggiewi. The monsignor was nominated for the award for his work to set up the home for the handicapped.

MELVIN JONES FELLOWSHIP



The Melvin Jones Fellowship (MJF) recognizes donations of US\$1000.

It is the backbone of LCIF, providing 75 percent of the foundations revenue. As recognition of humanitarian work, an MJF is an honour presented to those who donate US\$1000 to LCIF (Lions Clubs International Foundation) or to people for whom a donation was made by others.

Contributions can be made by individuals (including non Lions), clubs or districts. Donations may be in one sum, or in instalments of a minimum of US\$100 over a five-year period. Melvin Jones Fellows receive an attractive lapel pin, a plaque and a congratulatory letter.

It is possible to make a donation and choose the MJF recipient later.

MJF FACTS:

- The Fellowship was established in 1973 and the Progressive programme in 1986 in response to Lions' request for away to extend their commitment to LCIF.
- Donations through MJFs provide 75 percent of the Foundation's annual revenue.
- There are 54 levels in the PMJF programme.
- As of January 2016 there are 386804 recipients and 75067 PMJF recipients worldwide.
- All MJFs are invited to the annual luncheon held at the convention. The MJF luncheon began in 1984 and has been held at each convention since then.
- The names of MJFs are displayed on a computer in the LCIF Room at the International Headquarters at Oak Brook, Chicago, Illinois.

Through the Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) our Association is able to provide financial assistance whenever there is any natural calamity (earthquakes etc.). During the years of its existence LCIF has also been instrumental to provide funds for specific projects undertaken by Lions worldwide. In Malta we received donations to provide the Glaucoma Screening equipment.

MEDITERRANEAN SOLIDARITY OBSERVATORY



On April 1 during the meeting of the Board of Directors of the Mediterranean Solidarity Observatory held in Alexandria (Egypt) during the 2107 MSO Convention Past District Governor Lion Dorijan Maršič of Slovenia was elected as Coordinator, while PDG Ugo Lupatelli of Italy, PCC Harris Zachariadou of Greece, PDG Jalil Biouraoni of Tunisia and PDC Mourad Charif d'Ouazzane of Morocco were appointed to serve as members for the next two years(2017/2019).

PDG Massimo Fabio of Italy continues to serve as MSO Secretary and Archivist, a post he has held for the last decade.

Nineteen delegates representing ten member Mediterranean littoral countries were present at the meeting during which it was agreed that the 2019 Mediterranean Conference will be held in Beirut (Lebanon), while Antalya (Turkey) was confirmed as the venue for the 2018 Conference.

Lion Goran Zecevic, President of Lions Club Agram, one of the several clubs in Zagreb, Croatia, from District 126(Croatia) was a welcomed guest on April 5.

On his return home, Lion Goran who was in Malta on a business trip sent an email to our Club President. He was pleased to have attended our Club's meeting stating that it was a very interesting and informative experience.

Lion Goran's club has 18 members most of whom are very active in the club. He stated that the club has a good mix in terms of vocation, from interior decorators to a doctor who is a FRCP.

Lion Goran wrote that since he got back from Malta he spoke to some members about the idea of chartering a plane later this year (October or November) and inviting other Lions from Croatia to participate in a humanitarian visit to Malta whereby each participant would be charged an extra €100 for the trip towards a charitable donation. If we were to fill an Airbus we would thus have around €12000 for a donation which we could organise jointly by our two Clubs.

Certainly this is not a bad idea and it is hoped that the visit would materialise.

Lions in Croatia have been chartered during the last decade of the 20th century and have since grown in numbers with clubs following the motto WE SERVE to help the less fortunate people in their country. Lions Clubs in Croatia are quite active in their philanthropic activities.
