COMMEMORATING HUNDRED YEARS OF LIONISM

At a recent Zone meeting it was decided that the four Lions Clubs in Malta will commemorate this special event in the annals of Lions Clubs International by planting 100 olive tree saplings in the private garden of Dar tal-Providenza in Siggiewi. At first it was thought to hold this event on Sunday October 16 at the end of a special week dedicated to Lions worldwide. However since on this particular Sunday there is already another event being held at the Home, it was agreed that the planting event will be held on Tuesday December 13 after the 11a.m. Mass.

What's more we were advised that the soil was still very dry there was a risk of losing several of the saplings because of this condition.

This event will serve a twofold purpose since besides commemorating the Lions Centennial Celebrations, we will be also enriching the local environment. Five years ago some olive tree saplings were planted at Dar tal-Providenza and have since produced olives which were pressed to oil.

Details of the programme will be announced in due course. It is planned to erect a commemorative plaque in the particular area dedicated for this project.

These Agape Tables are of great archaeological and historical interest, as although there would have been several scattered around the Roman Empire, very few survive. From Pagan, Jewish and Christian symbols and graffiti found on pottery and on the walls it is evident that the burial site belonged to various religious denominations. Therefore there is no founded truth in the popular myth that Christians hid in these catacombs in times of persecution.

CULTURAL VISIT TO ST. PAUL'S CATACOMBS

On September 25th Lions Club Sliema resumed with the cultural outing after the summer recess.

31 members and friends turned up for the visit to St. Paul's Catacombs despite the inclement weather. The upgrade of the catacomb complex



made the visit a safer place but also the new museum gives a good interpretation of the funeral process practiced by the Romans. The visit starts with an audio-visual show lasting about 20 minutes. Malta belonged to the Roman Civilization from 218 BC to around 535 AD. The museum panels depict the funeral procession which took place in honour of the dead person, making sure that the soul is given a respectful farewell to the next world. Both an inhumation and cremation burial was practice at the time. There are also artefacts in glass and pottery which were found in tombs at Rabat.

From the museum we walked on to the Catacomb itself. On entering one can see a pair of Agape Tables around which the family partook of a symbolic meal in honour of the dead person about to be buried. This ceremony ended the nine days of mourning. >>>> 7

The Club made a donation of Euro1000 which was sent to District Governor Dott. Marcello Dassori.
