Her election to the highest rank of our Association was confirmed at the International Convention held in Boston, USA, this month. Lion Dr. Patti Hill becomes the second lady to become President of our Association. Lion Gudrun Yngvadottir from Iceland was the first lady President for the Lionistic Year 2018/19.

We have managed to provide transport to palliative care patients

who even though through their suffereings and their difficulties, they want to live on. And we, as Lions, supported their dignity through transport. We have supported a group of young men achieve their dream of being sportmen by sponsoring rowing boats for special needs persons to achieve their dreams of becoming para-athlete. To this I salute all the Past Presidents and I salute all of you who help Sliema Lions achieve all this".

A big "THANK YOU" to our now Past President Lion Norman Wilson, through whose guidance, dedication and hard work throughout the past two years stirred the Club into acheving all the goals we had set for ourselves. However our work never stops, and like we do every day for ourselves every morning, we shall continue to do so with others in support.

For a second, I'd like you to think of two members of Lions Club Sliema who are very, very different from you. It is not difficult, is it? One makes a part, another produces another different part, one supplies the fuel, another puts the nuts and bolts together, and yet another drives the machine. It works because we are all willing to help in our own special way contributing our own unique talents.

For that I must say a great big thank you. A President is only as good as his team. A leader can only lead if people are willing to follow.

I have some regrets too. There were some things that I did not manage. At the start of the year, I sketched out what changes I would like to see in the club including changes to the second meeting of the month, shadowing and role switching. Everyone nodded and agreed; there was not a dissenting voice. But I had not carried you with me; what I suggested was done half-heartedly and mostly not at all.

However, I was interested to note that Lion Treasurer Alex Arena brought out that same plan once more at the end of the year when we voted for our new Directors including Vice President. He said, referring to his desire to move on, "Am I stuck in this role for ever? Is there anyone trained enough shadowing me to take over?" But, all in all, we have had fun together and came together to do what we are meant to do – "TO SERVE", to help others less fortunate than ourselves.

I can think of one badly disab person who is one of the key people running the Paralympic Committee. He has had twenty-two operations. I can think of someone who is very fit, but has two badly deformed and shortened arms and felt he was useless and could no nothing until he started rowing on a machine at

Dar tal-Providenza and found out he was good at it. It gave him a real purpose in life and his attitude changed completely. Imagine what joy he and others will feels on our boat and rows for real in the water perhaps to compete for Paralympic Medal. I can think of families who were so grateful to have a car to take them to hospital with their sick relative and trollies and medical equipment waiting to be used in the new St. Michael's Hospice.

I see lonely hungry faces, some very young, many of whom are alone in this world having been rejected by their families and society so grateful to have a warm place to sit, a shower with shower gel, clean clothes and to eat a hot meat the Valletta Soup Kitchen. I was offered lunch there three times, and three times I refused. I could not take food out of some poor hungry mouth.

In November we held Diabetes Day and put at rest many minds regarding health. However, we alerted three minds that they have diabetes and that they need to see their doctor urgently. We also found a unique blood sample that excited the researchers at Mater Dei Hospital no end particularly in the shape of one of our members, Professor Alex Felice. It cost us nothing but it really will help save lives. In January a grateful Priest stood before me after Mass and accepted a cheque from us to support a very worthy organization — Dar tal-Providenza.

Thanks to the suggestion from one of our Lions we supported the Anglican Church in Sliema to repair their Bell Tower. Our role is not only to serve individuals, but also to serve the community by preserving the past to ensure continuity.

I can think of overseas disasters and the war in Ukraine where families are fleeing from a country, they love with absolutely nothing. They have lost their home, their belongings, their savings, and more, their father and/or mother.

Most of us being not so young swallow tablets to correct something that is not quite right in our bodies and some of us attend Mater Dei Hospital for the odd operation or two. Our deficiencies are put right. And every time this happens to me, I see in my mind's eye faces of people who have no proper hospital and who cannot think of tablets because there is no free health service in their country. Lions Club Sliema have provided thousands of pairs of spectacles to help people from Africa to see, and with a few golf balls hit at the Marsa Golf Tournament, helped people in Ethiopia to build a school.

Similar feelings of hopelessness must have been felt in the aftermath of the Turkey/Syria border earthquake where again we helped to the tune of Euro one thousand (1000).

I can think of little children playing in the street in a rough neighbourhood where drugs are the main currency pedalled by older youths. As these precious young children grow, they too will end up as druggies except that is no longer the case for some of them in part because there were over 100 people at the Phoenicia Hotel enjoying a lovely concert and having afternoon tea to help them. I sat at a table with tow of these Philippine children, now 21 and 22 years old, and I will never ever forget the grateful look and joy on their faces when they saw so many people from our Club and guests all there to help their little brothers and sisters and friends in the Philippines. And help them we did. Congratulations to all of you for we raised over Euro 1500.

Etched in my memory too was the joyous look in the eyes of those singing and dancing in their wheelchairs at Ta' Sawra Residence and who were all delighted with the presents we gave each of the 55 residents. It was a very bright day for them and many had been looking forward to our party for ages. We made a difference. One old resident even remembered that tall lady with a strong voice and big character and asked after her commenting that she made the party for them three years ago. She was referring to our dearest Lion Bella.

We must not forget those businesses that helped the Club giving up time, resources, profit, and manpower. There are many of these helpers and I am not going to list them all here but would like to mention The Phoenicia, Marsa Sports Club, Camilleri Paris Mode, Meridiana Winery, Jardinland and of course our new home, The Victoria Hotel. You see it is not the events that are important, it is what they stand for, what they do, what they cause and the help, relief, and joy that they give.



in Africa, especially the sub-Saharan part. Let's not forget the aftermath of the colonial occupation, hence the tidal wav3e of flows that should be regulated. Statictics have shown us the extent of this phenomenon, at world level, 3% (5% in Europe) of the population is concerned. Take into account the demographic decline in Europe and the needs of the labour market. Difference between migrants (voluntary emigration) and refugees (fleeing wars, persectuion). The public authorities, the states, the United Nations have made billions of dollars available, some of which is surely dispersed through inevitable corruption. The Lions work as free volunteers hence theey shoud be able to enter this mechanism of public funds to bring concrete help. For example a close collaboration between Clubs of the North and the South Mediterranean for training centres in the countries of origin. In short rely on regular immigration, training before leaving, help afterwards in the countries of arrival for an orderly integration into the world of work and therefore into the society.
