WORLD DIABETES DAY



November 14 has been designated as "World Diabetes Day" since it is the birth anniversary of Fredrick Banting, who along with Charles Best discovered insulin. In 1991, the day marked his 100th birthday anniversary and hence the

World Health Organisation announced November 14 as the day to raise awareness towards diabetes across the world.

As in previous years our Club commemorated this day by offering glucose testing at the fore court of the University of Malta. Testing was made by nurses while students from MMSA conducted health screening. All the necessary equipment was provided by MMSA and the Faculty of Health, while all glucose supplies were sponsored by Euro Pharma. Lions Prof. Alex Felice and Martin Ward made all the arrangements for the tests to be held at the University.

VISIT TO "DAR TAL-PROVIDENZA

The three Lions Clubs in Malta, namely Sliema, St. Paul's Bay and Mdina Malta Host paid a visit to Dar Tal-Providenza, the Church Home for persons with special needs. After Sunday mass said by the Director of the Home, Rev. Father Martin Micallef, the Presidents of the three clubs presented a cheque to the Director. The visit to this residence is a yearly event in the calendar of the three Maltese Lions Clubs. "Dar Tal-Providenza" (Providence Home) was founded by Mons. Michael Azzopardi in 1965 with the aim of offering a home with a warm and family environment for persons with disabilities who for some reason or other stay living with their family.

Since its inception the home has provided residential services to persons with disabilities. The services provided include permanent or temporary residence and various other services aimed to improve their wellbeing.

Home Mission which takes its name and charism from the Gospel is primarily a residential organisation committed to empowering persons with disabilities in a family-like environment which enhances and maximises their abilities.
